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

—Congratulations on your winning in the 38th All Japan Young Koi Show. Where is the point you focus in the koi keeping?

Hashimoto: I've been keeping dogs since I was a child. Among other company were tropical fish, marine water fish, reptiles, raptors, and koi. Besides, my interest of these days has spread to tuber plants and succulents. They make me very busy. (laughs)

—What made you pay attention to koi?

Hashimoto: Mr. Kanayama did. A friendly relationship with him turned my attention to koi. He was a member of the Ranchu club that I belonged to.


—Is he the man who often wins higher prizes in koi shows like All Japan

Koi Show?

Hashimoto: Yes, he is. I'm sure that he is familiar to many people, particularly famous in the world of Ranchu. When I first visited his home, he showed me a koi pond holding 50ton of water. The look of the pond gave me a strong impression of its being great. To my sorrow, at that time I didn't have any lots to build a pond.

—Having a piece of land particularly in a big city like Tokyo is very hard, isn't it?

Hashimoto: I almost gave it up. However, unexpectedly there was a vacancy available in the first floor of the building of my company. I thought that "This is the place where I should keep koi."

Soon after my determination I went to the nearby Tokyo Kanshogyo to see Mr. Shimizu, representing the fish shop. He introduced me Mr. Muto of Ikebukuko Nishikigoi, who had just set up business on his own. Since then I've counted on them.

started to keep koi and when you took part in competitions.

Hashimoto: You know, in the sector of Ranchu, we often enter for competitions. It's not unusual that I take an interest in koi shows.

— You say, this year marks the 6th year of your koi career. You have too many pictures of koi with glorious results to introduce all of them.

Hashimoto: Once that I determine to enter for a contest, I make every effort to approach to required levels of the Kokugyo Prize. This is the way I think. Two years after my involvement, I began to win the Kokugyo Prize.

My encounter with the Showa Sanshoku, the grand champion, happened last December. The koi had no Sumi marks at that time, so I intended to wait and see what was happening to it, maybe for a few years as a Tategoi. However, some Sumi marks drastically appeared this last spring. I decided that it was when. This was how the entry was realized. I'm looking forward to seeing its future, because it is still two. It is young enough to make me expect much of it.

— You sent other koi of your own growing to the events of the Kanto-koshinetsu Koi Show and the Oedo Nishikigoi-matsuri, didn't you?

Hashimoto: Yes. I sent my homegrown koi to the two koi shows. My goal for this summer is the Kantokoshinetsu Koi Show, and my hope for the future is to send home-grown koi to the All Japan Koi Show.



Perfect management for water lies in "regular, easy and short-term" treatment

— The sight of your pond is blocked from the street, no one will find out that here is a koi pond.

Hashimoto: Before starting pond construction, I consulted Mr. Shimizu for instruction. I built a little less than 12ton pond by making the best use of the narrow space.

—The pond has a ceiling, so there is no worry of causing sudden change in water quality by a torrential downpour. You have a boiler equipped, so there seems not to affect the stable breeding environment throughout the year.

Hashimoto: I put a priority to filtration by introducing a settling tank, a biological filtration system, two "Kagayaki" automatic filtering devices capable of a 50-ton pond. You may think the installation of as many as four filters is of over specification. But the preparation of this much can help keep koi and water in good shape even if I force the koi to eat much during the summer. And pond cleaning is set to be easy. "A regular, easy and quick" cleaning is a must.

I knew from my experience that it is very important to meet the necessities of pond equipment from the beginning. Adding something short later is a little too late. I didn't miss the boiler, full plumbing and drains from two different directions to prevent the pipes from clogging. I'm satisfied to have met the essentials within the limited space.

—I can see your close attention here and there.


Hashimoto: An aquarium even for marine water fish should have full equipment from the beginning. Then, fish can live long, and coral increase, too. If fish don't die, it means that there is no need to add new fish. There is less risks of breaking down the environment. If the environment is changed

later, it will weigh a large spending on you or cause high risks of ruining the health of koi.


— The same is true of koi, isn't it? **Hashimoto:** Each koi has its own environment to live and to be kept. Some should swim well, some should control swimming behavior, some should live in a large pond with a sparse population, reversely with a crowded population, some in a small pond sparsely, vice versa, densely-populated.

I don't mean that a large pond is good enough to keep pond environment safe. If the pond is smaller, it should have its own way of keeping.

In my case, I use a mud pond. In the pond at my house, there is a concern that the koi will not gain enough length. There is a possibility, to be sure, that the koi will perform well if they are in a sparsely-populated pond. But no one knows. In the meantime, the koi can grow in a mud pond, though they are

not expected to gain their width.

For the purpose of widening their body, I have to wait for the koi to come back to my pond from the mud pond. I can handle it here. Males need not go to



the mud pond, because they can grow better in the spring pond here. Each of you could find the way of developing your best performance within the scope of the environment you belong to.

- You are experienced with keeping

other various living creatures. Are there some charms of koi different from other fancy fish?

Hashimoto: The koi often disappoints me because they don't live up to my expectation (laughs). Reversely,

there is a case in which an ordinary koi transforms into a beautiful koi. That's what interests me very much.

—Now, the time is approaching when the koi are released to the mud pond. The pond is enlivened with large koi, and they can't wait.

Hashimoto: Yes, there are more than 30 individuals in it. I already feed them, but there is no problem with feeding, rather it makes the koi look better.

— The pond is occupied by many large koi. Have you made them grow as big as this from the stages of Tosai and the age two?

Hashimoto: At first almost all of them started with jumbo Tosai. Some of them were three, but they completely failed me (laughs).

Most of the koi that won the Kokugyo Prize or higher came to me when they were a jumbo Tosai. A few of them came to me at the age of two. I seldom buy finished koi.

Delightful of seeking a life with koi

—I have a question for you before I conclude this interview. It's about your wife. You always come to koi shows and events with her. I hear that she has a keen eye on koi.

Hashimoto: Yes, she is a koi critic. She knows everything about the koi I have.

—I also hear a story of Momotaro Kohaku which won the Adult Champion in the 50th All Japan Koi Show. She was the very person that found it, wasn't she?

Hashimoto: Yes. Things hap-

pened when I was looking at the picture of the koi. She insisted that we should go to Okayama to look at the life of the koi that worried me. We soon left for Okayama far from Tokyo. She immediately fell in love with that Kohaku then bought it.

We also go to dog shows together. She may be superior to me as far as determination, action and memory are concerned.

— You have a wide variety of living things around you, still you lavish your affection on them all. I'm very overwhelmed by your vitality.

Hashimoto: Now I feel I've reached the goal I set before. I'm wondering whether I should begin shifting the present idea of how to enjoy koi to how to raise the levels of koi.

— Your talks are full of variety, and I've enjoyed it very much. Thank you for today.



The second day started with free distribution of koi at 10 o'clock in the morning, followed by the award ceremony from noon and then a koi auction.





550 excellent koi exhibited by koi enthusiasts and breeders in the Chugoku and Shikoku region delighted visitors to the venue.

Seven members of the AJNPA were invited as judges: Mr. Futoshi Mano from Niigata, Mr. Tomoyoshi Kondo and Mr. Kurbjuhn Ingo from Tokai District, Mr. Seiji Masai and Mr. Shigeyuki Tsujikawa from Kansai District, and Mr. Koichi Taki and Mr. Shohei Takatsu from Kyushu District.



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
